Executive Summary

The Accessibility and Age-Friendly Committee and Town of Oliver staff collaborated for nearly a year to create the town's inaugural Accessibility Plan. Numerous individuals and organizations contributed valuable input and feedback throughout the development process.

The plan focuses on five areas and includes a total of 24 specific actions. The five focus areas are:

- **Incorporating accessibility:** Improvements to Town facilities, infrastructure, and public spaces.
- **Information:** Actions that provide stronger connections to Town information (e.g., education, communication, information).
- **Employment:** Actions expected from the Town of Oliver as an employer.
- **Work with community partners:** Actions with community partners focused on improving access in the community of Oliver.
- **Continuous improvement:** Create a core principle of continually improving the accessibility of the Town's infrastructure and services (e.g., Town staff learning and training, new programs/services).

Examples of specific actions in each of the areas of focus include Town staff training, improving Town crosswalks by adding audible signals, working with locals to ensure sidewalks are clear after snow events, and more. The full list of specific actions start on page 17 of this document.

This plan is not intended to be *written in stone*. This document is a *living document*. If you have accessibility suggestions, feedback, or comments about Town infrastructure, programs, and services, please provide feedback to the Town through one of the methods outlined by the Town of Oliver's Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee on page 7 of this document.

1.2 About this Document

This is the Town of Oliver’s first plan focused on accessibility. The plan’s development was led by the Town’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee with support from the Town’s corporation administration, parks and recreation, public works, and social development teams, using guidance from the Province of British Columbia and [Disability Alliance BC](#).

This is intended to be a *living document*. The Town must adapt as emerging opportunities and feedback arise that were not anticipated or received during the development of this plan. Members of the community are welcome to provide feedback and suggestions to the Town through the Town’s accessibility feedback mechanism (please see the message below from the Committee on the accessibility feedback mechanism on page 7).

The document generally follows the recommended formatting from the Disability Alliance BC for accessibility plans. The order of some of the sections have been adapted to fit Oliver’s specific context. It is in size 14 font.

2.1 Message from the Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee

To the Community of Oliver:

The Town of Oliver's Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee's purpose is (from Council Policy *Advisory Committees Policy and Terms of Reference*):

The Oliver Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee will support the Town's efforts to implement municipal recommendations in the Oliver Age Friendly Action Plan and will support the Town with developing a Town of Oliver Accessibility Plan in alignment with the *Accessibility British Columbia Act*. The Committee will support the municipality with developing a Town of Oliver Accessibility Plan and developing a feedback mechanism around areas such as access to Town services, Town communications, and Town infrastructure. The Committee will advise and support the municipality with implementing the Town of Oliver Accessibility Plan and responding to suggestions received through the feedback mechanism. Additionally, the Committee will aid with meeting the Town's obligations as an age friendly community recognized by the World Health Organization (WHO).

The Committee has worked together throughout the fall 2023, and winter and spring 2024 with Town of Oliver staff to develop the Town's Accessibility Plan. We were chosen by the Town in 2023 through a public call for applicants. Individuals with knowledge or experience related to accessibility were invited to apply to join in the Committee. We thank members of the public that have submitted feedback and suggestions that informed the plan. Additionally, we thank other municipalities, including the City of Kamloops, that have shared plans and resources with our Committee. This informed our Committee's own discussions and the long list of preliminary recommendations the Committee considered for this plan.

This is the Town’s first plan focusing specifically on accessibility. The plan is a starting point for the Town of Oliver for the next several decades. This plan focuses on actions for 2024, 2025, and 2026. 3.1 Background about the Town of Oliver

Aboriginal people occupied the territory, in which Oliver lies, from time immemorial when settlement by Europeans began in the 19th century. Osoyoos Indian Reserve No. 1 stretches from Gallagher Lake area to Osoyoos and adjoins the Town's eastern boundary. The Osoyoos Indian Band was established by the BC Government in 1877 as part of the Okanagan Nation which consists of 7 Member Bands on the North side of the US Border.

The first European activity in the area was gold mining, with the staking of the first claim in 1887, and the establishment of the Town of Fairview in 1890 on the benches above Oliver to the west. Folklore has it that a one armed gold prospector named Reid discovered gold in this area, and the Town of Fairview (located just outside what is now known as Oliver) became home to gold miners, ranchers and businessmen. Fairview was one of B.C.'s largest towns at the turn of the century. The gold rush died and sadly, so did Fairview, with Oliver springing up in its wake.

The local government was incorporated as a village in 1945 to provide local services to the community of Oliver (and neighbours). One of the purposes of the Corporation of the Town of Oliver is to help plan and shape the future of the community of Oliver. This includes social, environmental, and economic development. The accessibility of the Town's programs and services is important to the social well-being of the community of Oliver.

3.2 The Town of Oliver's Accessibility Story

The [Disability Alliance BC](#) recommends that accessibility plans include a section called, Our Accessibility Story.

This plan, the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility Plan (2024-2026), is the Town’s first plan focused on accessibility. It is intended to improve and enhance the community of Oliver for all members of and visitors to the community. The Town’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee recognizes there is much work to do to enhance accessibility in Oliver. This plan for 2024, 2025, and 2026 is intended to act as a founding starting point. It is the Town’s first intentional and purposeful step to incorporate accessibility considerations into all of its work.

The Town of Oliver encourages all members of the community to be involved in the initiatives identified in this plan, and to use the Town’s accessibility feedback mechanisms to share suggestions and feedback with the Town and the Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee. It will take a whole community approach over the next few decades to make all areas of life in Oliver universally accessible. The Town wants the support of and participation from everyone in the community.

3.3 Definitions

Some of the key definitions and terms used in this document are outlined in Table 1.

4.1 The Town of Oliver's Accessibility Plan (2024-2026) Overview

This section of the Town of Oliver's Accessibility Plan (2024-2026) includes the following:

- The process to develop this plan,
- The importance of this work,
- The principles informing this work, and
- The three year action plan.

4.2 Process to Develop the Plan

The process to develop the Town of Oliver's Accessibility Plan (2024-2026) included the following steps:

1. The Town of Oliver created and formed the Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee to guide and have input into the development of the plan (see Appendix A for a list of meeting dates and topics of the Committee),
2. Creation of a Town of Oliver accessibility webpage (<https://www.oliver.ca/town-services/accessibility>) to provide public information about the Town's Accessibility Plan and to provide a webpage for members of the public to submit feedback and suggestions to the Town of Oliver,
3. Feedback received through the Town's feedback mechanism was brought to the Committee for review and consideration,
4. Tours of key municipal buildings and facilities in October 2023 with the Committee, and open to members of the public, and
5. Town staff facilitated four one-to-one interviews, reviewed other municipal plans, and conducted a literature review (a summary of this work was presented to the Committee during the November 7, 2023 Committee meeting).

4.3 Summary of What Was Learned

This is a brief summary of what was learned through the learning process (one-to-one interviews, reviewed other municipal plans, and conducted a literature review). This is provided in no particular order.

Theme 1: This is important work

It was clear from the one-to-one interviews conducted by Town staff (and summarized to the Committee during the November 7, 2023 Committee meeting), that this work is very important for all members of the community. All individuals that participated in an interview shared that there are activities and initiatives in the community that they cannot participate in; there are many times that they feel excluded.

Theme 2: Physical: Lots of challenges

There are some positives in the community. Some specific public buildings are more physically accessible than others, and there are some organizations in the community focusing on making buildings and programs more accessible.

There are also many challenges related to physical accessibility in the community. This includes public sidewalks, parking lots, front/main doors and entrances, signs around the community, the lack of lighting in some areas, and so on. Individuals that participated in the one-to-one interviews specifically identified that some of the physical accessibility challenges in Oliver led to them not being able to access some public buildings and programs/services.

Theme 3: Digital Communication and Engagement

The Town uses a lot of digital communication channels, such as social media, emails, and news releases that are shared on digital media channels. There was a request that the Town continue to find ways to share information and communication using other channels (e.g., paper mail outs). Specific recommendations shared included a paper mailout every 4-6 months from

the Town with important information/updates, and to ensure that paper copies of key information is available at all Town facilities (Municipal Hall, Finance Office, Recreation Office) for individuals that may not be able to access the Town's webpage, or may have other accessibility considerations where paper is a more inclusive option for their specific needs. There was also a suggestion that Town events and consultation activities should be fully accessible from a physical, language, transportation, and universal accessibility perspective.

Theme 4: Technology

There were several themes shared around the use of technology. Some of the specific recommendations include using a larger font size in Town documents, ensuring that Town documents can be read by software (e.g., screen readers), and that all Town technology software have multiple options (e.g., VoyentAlert! allows individuals to choose between text messages or phone calls). Also, individuals shared that they prefer to speak with a Town staff member directly rather than use email, online software, or other technology to communicate with the Town.

Theme 5: Employment with the Town

While all four individuals interviewed as part of the development of the plan had never been employed by the Town, several did identify that they would be hesitant to apply for a job with the Town of Oliver. This mostly was based on concerns about physical accessibility in key Town building and facilities. For example, concerns were shared that some of the Town's buildings do not have automatic opener buttons, may not have fully accessible washrooms, and/or elevators.

Theme 6: Other

Generally, there are some strong positives throughout Oliver related to accessibility, and a desire that this work be prioritized. The Town must have a strong role in supporting accessibility in the community of Oliver through advocacy (e.g., for funding), capacity building (e.g., training), and regulations.

4.4 This Work is Important

Accessibility is an important component of all Town of Oliver initiatives. A more accessible Oliver benefits the entire community – for example, the efforts of the Town of Oliver to be more accessible will benefit individuals of all levels of abilities, older adults that may use a mobility aid, young families with a stroller, individuals living with Autism Spectrum Disorder, and so on. There is an opportunity for real and meaningful impact on the community through the implementation of the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility Plan (2024-2026). By including individuals with living experience, and with the Town of Oliver helping lead the way with its own infrastructure and services in the community, Oliver can and will be a more inclusive and accessible community.

4.5 The Principles Informing this Work

The Town of Oliver used the Province of British Columbia’s principles in the *Accessible British Columbia Act*, as a starting point for developing principles for the Oliver Accessibility Plan. During the July 2023, August 2023, and November 2023 Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee meetings, the following six principles were endorsed by the Committee for inclusion in the Accessibility Plan. These are provided in no particular order.

- **Inclusion:** All residents of Oliver can fully and equitably participate in the community.
- **Adaptability:** The Accessibility Plan will evolve as there are new services, technology, and as attitudes and beliefs change.
- **Diversity:** Every person is unique, and the Town acknowledges the diversity within the disability community.
- **Collaboration:** Everyone has a role to play, and the Town will work with community partners on accessibility, where possible.
- **Self-Determination:** The Town will empower people with disability to make their own choices and pursue the lives they wish to live.

- **Universal Design:** “The design and composition of an environment so that it can be accessed, understood, and used to the greatest extent possible by all people regardless of their age, size, ability or disability” (adapted from the Centre for Excellence in Universal Design).

4.6 The Three-Year Action Plan

The three-year action plan focused on five priorities identified by the Committee. These include:

- **Incorporating accessibility:** Improvements to Town facilities, infrastructure, and public spaces.
- **Information:** Actions that provide stronger connections to Town information (e.g., education, communication, information).
- **Employment:** Actions expected from the Town of Oliver as an employer.
- **Work with community partners:** Actions with community partners focused on improving access in the community of Oliver.
- **Continuous improvement:** Create a core principle of continually improving the accessibility of the Town’s infrastructure and services (e.g., Town staff learning and training, new programs/services).

Using the five priorities, the action plans in Tables two to six focus on 24 specific actions in each of the three years of this plan. This section presents the specific actions by each calendar year, plus items that are ongoing. Additional background information considered by the Committee is included in Appendix B.

4.6.1 2024 Actions

These are the two actions recommended by the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee for 2024 (Table 2).

Staff time from the public works and social development teams will be used in 2024 to complete these actions.

4.6.2 2025 Actions

These are the seven actions recommended by the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee for 2025 (see Table 3).

To fund these activities, the Town will apply for the accessibility grant from the Social Planning and Research Council of British Columbia (SPARC BC) for \$25,000. The Town will submit its application in late 2024 so, if the application is successful, the funds will be available in 2025. Additionally, any amounts

over the SPARC BC grant amount will be included for Council’s consideration in the Town of Oliver’s 2025 financial plan/budget.

4.6.3 2026 Actions

These are six actions recommended by the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee for 2026 (see Table 4).

To fund these activities, Town staff will work with the Committee in 2025 to finalize the list of actions for 2026 and these amounts will be included for Council’s consideration in the Town of Oliver’s 2026 financial plan/budget.

4.6.4 Ongoing Actions

These are seven actions recommended by the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee to be ongoing actions (please see Table 5).

To fund these activities, Town staff will work with the Committee in 2024, 2025, and 2026 and bring forth actions, as opportunities arise (e.g., funding opportunities, a new project that can have accessibility incorporated into the project plan).

4.6.5 Deferred Actions

These are two actions recommended by the Town of Oliver’s Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee and are deferred for the time being.

5.1 Monitoring and Evaluation

The following monitoring and evaluation initiatives are recommended:

- The Committee will meet approximately every three to six months. Town staff will provide an overview of the status of the action plan (e.g., completed actions, actions in progress, actions that have yet to be started) for discussion and review by the Committee, along with other relevant items for each meeting.
- The Committee will provide, at a minimum, an annual update to Council that includes progress on each item in the three-year action plan (section 4.6).
- Pursuant to the *Act*, The Town's feedback mechanism remains open throughout this plan.
- As part of continuous improvement and incorporating accessibility priorities, all significant infrastructure and built environment projects should be reviewed by the Committee, if project timelines allow.

5.2 Town of Oliver Accessibility Feedback Mechanism

The Town of Oliver's accessibility feedback mechanism is an important component of ongoing monitoring. Members of the public can provide feedback to the Town of Oliver through the methods outlined by the Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee on page 7 of this document.

All feedback received from members of the public will be reviewed during an open Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee meeting by the members of the Town of Oliver's Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee. As a *living document*, this plan will be updated, as necessary, based on suggestions received through the Town's feedback mechanism.

6.1 Summary

This is very important work for the Town of Oliver. As the Town's first plan focused on accessibility, the Town of Oliver's Accessibility Plan (2024-2026) provides an important founding first step for the Town to incorporate accessibility considerations into all of its work – this includes all Town buildings/facilities, all Town services and programs, and for all current and prospective Town employees. It will take a whole community approach for the community and Town to achieve a universally accessible community for all individuals. The Town encourages all individuals to participate in the implementation of initiatives in this plan, and all future public participation opportunities. The Town looks forward to continuing to work with the Accessibility and Age Friendly Committee on implementing the actions in this plan.
